

Green Card Renewal Checklist

1. Determine Your Eligibility

Confirm that Form I-90 is the correct form for your situation. Common reasons include:

- Your 10-year Green Card is expired or will expire within 6 months.
- Your card was lost, stolen, damaged, or destroyed.
- Your name or other biographic information has legally changed.

Note: This form is NOT for conditional residents. If you have a 2-year conditional card, you typically file Form I-751 or Form I-829.

2. Gather Required Documents

Collect clean, legible copies of your supporting evidence:

- A copy of your Permanent Resident Card (front and back).
- If unavailable, a copy of a government-issued photo ID (e.g., driver's license, passport).
- If your name changed, a copy of the legal document proving the change.
- The required filing fee. Check the official USCIS page for the current amount.

3. Complete and File Form I-90

You can typically file online or by mail. Filing online is often recommended for faster processing and easier tracking. Double-check every answer for accuracy before submitting.

4. Attend Biometrics Appointment

After filing, you will likely receive a notice for a biometrics appointment, where USCIS will take your fingerprints, photograph, and signature. Do not miss this appointment.
